START YOUR CAREER DEVELOPMENT EFFORTS

The Law Career Services office offers a number of high-tech/IP-oriented sessions during the year. Due to NALP regulations, most LCS activities do not start for 1Ls until November. To find out more about LCS events, go to <http://law.scu.edu/careers/>.

As a 1L, you should begin to build your network of lawyers and other colleagues who can be good information resources and perhaps help you find a job. How do you network?

- When you attend events, talk with speakers/panelists.
- Volunteer to work at conferences and seminars.
- Get involved with local and national professional organizations.
- Conduct informational interviews with alumni and other lawyers.
- Attend career fairs, such as the LCS's Silicon Valley High Tech Legal Career Fair, the San Francisco Intellectual Property Law Association Bay Area Job Fair and the Loyola Patent Law Interview Program held in Chicago (see <http://www.luc.edu/law/career/patent.html>). **IMPORTANT:** To attend the Loyola Chicago job fair for a 2L summer job, you will need to apply in *February of your 1L year!*
